Since launching in October 2018, McCarthy Tétrault's Inclusion Now gift has made a difference in the lives of thousands of individuals across Canada each year.

McCarthy Tétrault's trailblazing five-year, \$5-million commitment is being invested in United Way Centraide agencies and programs in Vancouver, Calgary, Toronto, Montréal, and Québec City that work to remove barriers to inclusion for marginalized groups and populations who face daily challenges: newcomers, Indigenous peoples, members of the LGBTQ2S community, women, and people with disabilities.

The language of community

Rama and her husband, Fares, knew it was time to re-locate to Canada from Syria when it became increasingly dangerous to even walk out their front door. "We often went through long periods without water or electricity," Rama recalls. "When I did have to leave the house, I would say goodbye to my daughter and I would never know if I would come back or not." The couple felt scared and increasingly hopeless as they waited four long years for their immigration and refugee application to be approved.

When they learned that their new home would be Montréal, they immediately signed up for French classes—despite the risks. For months they travelled to school as the world outside their door became more and more dangerous.

When the family finally arrived in Montréal, it was a huge relief. But they quickly realized they'd need more help to settle in to their new home.

"It's very difficult to come to a new country where you don't know the language," says Rama, who taught at a local university prior to arriving in Canada. "We had to get around and try to understand all the documents we had to fill out. There are so many things you need to do when you arrive, and this wasn't always easy."

Fortunately, they met some fellow Syrians in their community who told them about CARI St-Laurent, a United Way agency that provides information, support and a variety of services to newcomers including childcare and settlement services. "We took French classes for eight months, full-time," says Rama. "Our daughter went to daycare at the agency, so Fares and I were able to learn French as quickly as possible. It was a little stressful, but we chose to see the experience as an opportunity for our family."

The agency also helped Rama and Fares, who worked as a lawyer in his home country, fill out forms, access health care, get insurance and complete many other important administrative tasks that come with moving to a new country. But Rama is especially grateful for the social aspects of the agency's programming. "The projects and programs here not only help newcomers integrate into the community, they also help Québeckers get to know us," says Rama. "It lets us meet people here and talk about our different cultures—and we can practice our French!"

"When I think of the future now, I have hope," adds Rama, who is incredibly grateful to United Way Centraide donors like you who are helping new Canadians just like her receive a warm welcome.

Diamond Willow Youth Lodge

Under the guidance of Indigenous Elders, United Way of Calgary and Area partnered with Miskanawah to develop the Diamond Willow Youth Lodge. The Lodge, which opened in the fall of 2018, offers a welcoming and inclusive gathering place for Indigenous youth to connect with peers and build positive informal relationships with Elders in a safe and non-stigmatizing setting. Youth can hang out, connect with their culture, participate in a variety of programs, and learn about the supports and





services available to them throughout Calgary and area. Youth are always welcome to stop in for a warm drink and conversation—there are board games, craft supplies, computers, and smudge available, and all services are offered at no cost. We acknowledge that Calgary's reported outcomes are lower than other regions, but we recognize the importance of Diamond Willow Youth Lodge's approach—to deliver a broad range of high impact services to a smaller clientele. The Diamond Willow Youth Lodge is part of United Way of Calgary and Area's broader Indigenous Strategy.

346 youth visited Diamond Willow Youth Lodge last year.

21 youth have connected with Ceremony.

239 youth have been connected to Elders.

204 events and workshops were delivered.

VANCOUVER

United Way of the Lower Mainland School's Out Programs

Operating in 29 locations, the School's Out program ensures that children have access to quality programs and opportunities that address their developmental and cultural needs. Children (ages 6-12) are safe in the critical after-school hours, while participating in activities that help them to reach their full potential, including learning support, physical and recreational activities, access to healthy snacks and meals, and life skills support.

1,052 Indigenous children supported last year.

TORONTO

Native Canadian Centre of Toronto:

Eshkiniigjik Naandwechigegamig— A Place for Healing Our Families

The Eshkiniigjik Naandwechigegamig program is provided in partnership with Parkdale Queen West Community Health Centre, and provides priority access for participants with mental health and addictions requiring primary care and psychiatric consultation. Culturally-based group programming includes life skills, recovery, resiliency, artistic expression, language, supports circles, and outdoor education.





646 adults aged 25-64 received services, improving their capacity to cope with mental health issues, reducing their social isolation, and acessing complementary health or social services.

"I was lost in every way when I found this program. Through the agency I received access to counselling, healing circles, meals, activities such as beading, martial arts, Ojibwa language classes, and networking groups. I am now drug-free and in recovery, I have left the abusive relationship poisoning my life, I have mended relationships with family and friends, and I have formed new long-lasting relationships through this incredible agency. The Native Canadian Centre of Toronto is a place of healing for all First Nations, Métis, Inuit, and non-status peoples. It is a home and place of safety when all is lost."

WOMEN

MONTRÉAL

Network of women's centres throughout Greater Montréal

This network of 22 women's centres and shelters within the Greater Montréal region helps to make a difference in the lives of close to 78,000 women and their loved ones each year. These agencies specifically aim to support vulnerable women in various aspects of their lives, with the goal of improving their living conditions, breaking their social isolation, and promoting their autonomy. Women's centres offer services including discussion groups and support workshops on a range of topics, including housing, violence, immigration, education, employment, and mental health support.

3,315 women and their loved ones were assisted through programs, education, and advocacy efforts.

80% of those who participated in the "Life Story Workshops" reported feeling less alone.

QUÉBEC CITY

41 organizations providing services for women

This collective impact network of 41 organizations delivers programs specifically designed to meet the needs of women in vulnerable situations. This network reaches over 92,000 individuals annually, supporting women's centres and community residential facilities that serve women affected by physical, psychological, or sexual violence, and programs that assist families with parenting challenges. Centraide's investment not only helps women to improve their situation, but also acts upon the root causes of poverty, in all its forms.

1,874 women supported last year.

43% of the women in the supported shelters were able to find a permanent home last year.

Following the #MeToo movement, the number of women coming forward to seek help has exploded – one program addressing sexual violence served **30%** more women in 2019 than in 2018.

Barbra Schlifer Commemorative Clinic

The clinic provides access to effective and integrated professional justice and community services to marginalized populations of women who have survived violence and whom accessibility is most often denied. The objectives of the program include training students, and thereby building a better response to the issues of violence against women, and improving the legal narrative that informs these judgements.

2,032 women served.

769 survivors and witnesses of domestic and gender-based violence were connected to counselling and other supports.

66 Cristina stayed with her abusive husband for the sake of her children—she was afraid of what he might do if she left. But when he threatened her life in front of her two young children, she knew she had to escape. When Cristina met with us, she was overwhelmed and exhausted. She was unsure of how to navigate the legal system and concerned she would fail her children. With help from the Barbra Schlifer Commemorative Clinic, Cristina succeeded in getting a restraining order against her husband, and now, she has full custody of her children.

Women United

Women United is a network of like-minded donors who have the talent, expertise, and networks necessary to make a real difference in the lives of women experiencing poverty and their families. By partnering with United Way Greater Toronto, the collective generosity of Women United enables women facing multiple barriers to gain access to the opportunities they need to succeed. In addition to funding 13 womenfocused programs working across Peel, Toronto, and York Region, Women United is supporting United Way's Women's Impact Fund, a \$10-million investment in programs that tackle #UNIGNORABLE issues affecting women, including poverty, homelessness, and domestic violence.

Network of newcomer welcome centres

Newcomer families are assisted to successfully settle and integrate into their new communities. Through a network of 12 key welcome centres, the project has helped over 61,000 newcomers by providing education and support with the settlement process, building community networks, and connections to key resources.

3,069 individuals assisted last year.

354 newcomers took part in workshops that helped them gain a better understanding of Québec culture from a perspective of integration.

25 immigrants who participated in a volunteer expertise program subsequently entered employment re-integration programs.

Rexdale Women's Centre

The agency provides settlement supports, employment and personal counselling, life skills training, health workshops, English as a Second Language instruction, information and referral, community outreach, child minding, crisis intervention and violence prevention supports, and parenting programs.

478 immigrant, refugee and/or racialized women experiencing gender-based violence accessed programs.

112 women found employment or re-entered the workforce.

151 women pursued training and further education.

"I am a new immigrant woman to Canada. Immediately after arriving, my husband hit me and began emotionally abusing me. With the help, support, and guidance of the counselor a safety plan was put in place. I received help in finding a shelter and housing in the community. I am now working and thinking of going back to school to upgrade my education and skills so I can get a better job."

The 519 Church Street Community Centre: Early Learning and Parenting Program

The Early Learning and Parenting Program provides a welcoming, safe, and inclusive space for members of LGBTQ2S families to be their authentic selves as they take part in arts, recreational, and educational programming. The program offers queer and trans parenting courses that explore practical, emotional, social, financial, medical, and legal issues related to becoming a parent. Sixteen hundred parents and children are served each year.





1,020 families improved their understanding and/or skills about child development and parenting.

1,120 children increased their readiness, independence and skills for learning, such as communication and social skills.

"Regardless of intersectionality, sexual orientation, gender identity or gender expression or diverse family configurations, all are welcome here! The 519 EarlyON Centre has the privilege of being the first community centre that many newcomers have ever experienced and we are honored to be where they first learn about the LGBTQ2S community. We are more than just an EarlyON Centre to these families—we are community, we are an extension of families, and we are part of their circle of support. We see families from as far as Barrie and Hamilton and even farther, like China and New Zealand, all coming to have a sense of community."

Community Living Toronto

The Bridging Diversity and Inclusion program increases understanding and improves access to services for individuals with an intellectual disability who are LGBTQ2S and/or newcomers to Canada. The program aims to promote safety, belonging, and social opportunities for LGBTQ2S youth and adults with intellectual disabilities, and increase service and community participation for racialized newcomer families who have children with intellectual disabilities.

495 individuals served.

97 individuals enhanced their social support and peer networks to reduce social isolation.

91 individuals increased their knowledge and confidence in navigating and accessing services.

We needed help for our daughter and were invited to an information session at the community hub where Community Living Toronto presented about their services as well as what they were doing in my community. I felt very welcome and could even get materials in Urdu to share with my family."

VANCOUVER

McCarthy Tétrault participated in United Way of the Lower Mainland's Tech Grind fundraiser. A team solicited pledges from their peers and raced up the Grouse Grind in support of United Way. Team McCarthy Tétrault blew away the competition this year, netting the most donations and raising over \$8,000 for United Way!



CALGARY

In October 2019, McCarthy Tétrault partners attended an oral report for the Diamond Willow Youth Lodge. This was a circle discussion facilitated by Elder Reg Crowshoe, United Way's Indigenous Protocol & Cultural Technician, where youth participants and staff shared stories of the impact the Lodge has had to date. Elder Reg Crowshoe also led a Lunch and Learn session in November, on the topics of Cultural Confusion and Paralleling, and Western and Indigenous rules of law.



66 The oral report provided by the Diamond Willow Youth Lodge and United Way was a powerful and effective accountability tool. It's one thing to read statistics and data about Indigenous youth, yet quite another to learn about the experiences of the youth, directly from the program's facilitators and participants. The report process affirmed the importance of working collectively, and I know it will leave a longstanding imprint on the members of our Firm who participated. McCarthy Tétrault's involvement in the Diamond Willow Youth Lodge is a source of pride for our Calgary office. We hope to strengthen this relationship and increase our engagement in the years to come.



THANK YOU

As the COVID-19 pandemic has made abundantly clear, the greatest burden of crisis often falls upon those who are already vulnerable. If what we want is an inclusive and equitable society, we must be ready and willing to dismantle the barriers that block some of us from success.
